They have a common desire to explore conceptual and historical foundations of the biosciences, and to look at the complex interrelations of science and society. 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In Biology and Society, we do things a little differently. As part of the New American University organized around knowledge creation instead of traditional disciplines, we are housed among the life sciences and maintain close working relationships with researchers in biology as well as law, medicine, economics, ethics, philosophy, history, and public policy. Students can join our studies through several entry portals, each with a different emphasis and all working together to enhance learning. All are coordinated through the Center for Biology and Society. cbs.asu.edu

Our scholars work together across disciplines drawing on multiple skills, yet maintain their own emphases. For instance, those primarily interested in philosophy can enter through History and Philosophy of Science option, while those who are primarily interested in theoretical biology, bioethics, or the history and philosophy of biology can enter through the Biology and Society option.

This structure allows students to go on to careers in traditional disciplines, interdisciplinary programs, medicine, law, public health, government, or industry by preparing them to ask and answer interesting questions, no matter where they lie.
